# FURTHER EDUCATION AFTER GCSES

Taking the next steps with your young learner





Deciding what to do after GCSEs can be a little overwhelming. There are many options to consider. Here, we provide some key information about what to expect this year and how to help your young learner make an informed choice.



#### Consider:

- What type of learner are they: academic, practical or technical?
- What career ambitions or aspirations do they have?
- What qualifications do they need to get there? (If there is a specific degree your young learner is interested in, look at what the entry requirements are and explore the different ways this can be achieved.)
- If they are not yet ready to make that decision, which subjects do they enjoy or excel in the most?

# WHAT TYPE OF COURSE IS RIGHT FOR MY YOUNG LEARNER?

#### **VOCATIONAL**

My young learner studies best with a hands-on approach and they enjoy a mixture of theory and practical work. They would either like to start work after their course, go on to an apprenticeship or go to university.

#### **T-LEVELS**


My young learner wants to specialise in their subject through classroom study and industry placement. They will go on to take a higher apprenticeship, go straight into employment or go to university.

#### A-LEVELS

My young learner is academic and would like to keep their options open by studying a range of subjects, before going to university or finding employment.

#### **APPRENTICESHIPS**

My young learner has chosen their career and wants to start work right away, completing their training and qualification whilst in employment.













# YOUR YOUNG LEARNER'S STUDY PROGRAMME

Their course will combine:

- Their main qualification
- Maths and English if they haven't already achieved GCSE grade 4 or higher
- Work experience, related to their course.

### Maths and English

Maths and English are essential for future employment. If your son or daughter doesn't achieve grade 4 or higher in these subjects, it is a government requirement that they continue to study them as part of their timetabled further education.







**DID YOU KNOW?** 

#### **WORK EXPERIENCE**

Work experience is a key component of our full-time students' learning programmes and most students will complete a minimum of 60 hours per academic year, dependent on the type of course they are studying. CWA has a dedicated team of work placement coordinators to support our students with this.

Work placements need to be relevant to your son or daughter's programme of study, and a meaningful and challenging placement will enable them to develop vital skills, known as "soft skills", in readiness for employment. These include teamwork, communication, using their initiative and being adaptable. This will also enable your young learner to get a sense of whether they are making the right career choice for them.



#### **WANT TO GO TO UNIVERSITY?**

Studying a T-level or most level 3 vocational courses<sup>†</sup> are the equivalent of studying three A-levels? All three qualifications can achieve up to 168 UCAS points:

#### SIXTH FORM

- Students can study A-levels and some vocational courses.
- If your young learner has progressed through the same school, the environment and teachers will already be familiar to them.
- The formality of school tends to continue, especially as younger pupils still attend the same school. Some students prefer a learning environment which is more regulated in this way.
- The academic transition to A-levels can still be a challenging step.

#### **AT COLLEGE**

- Students are treated more independently and have the freedom to manage their own learning – a great stepping stone for university and working life.
- The college day will be longer, typically 8:45am to 4:30pm, and students will be on site for three or four days (depending on their study programme) each week - although they will need to plan their individual study in their free time.
- Courses will include practical work experience, providing preparation for employment in your son or daughter's chosen sector.
- There is an extensive range of course subjects and types to choose from, taught by industry-trained staff in specialist facilities.

#### LEARNING SUPPORT

Our programmes are designed to support your young learner and our experienced and dedicated staff are always on hand to offer advice and help.

- Each full-time student will be allocated a course/personal tutor, who will monitor your young learner's progress, providing guidance for developing their skills.
- Subject tutors will provide prompt feedback on learning progress.
- The course director is responsible for the overall management of the course.
- Learners studying an apprenticeship are allocated an apprenticeship advisor instead, who will support your young learner through their programme, monitor their working conditions to ensure they are working safely, review their progress at regular interviews (through visits to their workplace and at college, if necessary) and maintain regular contact with their course tutor/assessors and employer.

# SAFEGUARDING, **WELFARE AND** WELLBEING

The student welfare team offers a confidential service that provides advice and support to help students with any worries or concerns that they may have about themselves or others. This includes safeguarding concerns, mental health issues and worries about their course/starting college. They work closely with students, parents/carers and external agencies to ensure that the right support is in place to help the student settle into studying at CWA, enjoy their course and reach their full potential. #### TRAVELLING TO COLLEGE

It's easy to get to and from college, as all of our campuses are well-serviced by local bus services. We also have bicycle shelters and limited car parking on each site. King's Lynn campus is a short walk from the train station, while a shuttle bus, free for Norfolk students, runs from Waterbeach station to our Cambridge campus.

# SUPPORT FOR YOUNG LEARNERS: LOOKED AFTER / IN CARE / CARE LEAVERS

They work closely with social workers, personal advisors and course teams to ensure that the student has the right support in place to meet their full potential and achieve on their course. # **ADDITIONAL LEARNING SUPPORT**



CWA welcomes applications from learners with a wide range of disabilities and learning difficulties and is committed to providing a productive and supportive environment to help your son or daughter reach their potential and fulfil their ambitions.

The Additional Learning Support (ALS) team are responsible for assessing any additional needs to ensure the right support is in place for your young learner when they start college. They work closely with teaching staff and, where relevant, parents and external professionals to develop a suitable support programme to meet the needs of students.

Typical areas of support include:

- Autistic Spectrum Disorders
- Emotional and behavioural needs
- ADHD/ADD
- Learning difficulties
- Mental health difficulties
- Physical and mobility difficulties
- Hearing/visual impairments
- Dyslexia
- Literacy/numeracy difficulties.



If you feel your young learner needs support, please discuss their needs with our ALS team as early as possible, so that we can plan effectively and ensure a successful college experience for them.

If an area of support is not listed here, don't worry, we may still be able to support you. Ask for our Inclusive Learning guide, which will help to answer your questions and provide details of more opportunities for your young person. We also have provision for young learners with social, emotional and mental health difficulties at Downham Market.


Your young learner can apply for more than one course at more than one provider. If they are not quite sure, their final decision does not have to be made until GCSE results have been released.
