COURSE DESCRIPTION

The two subjects are fascinating, but by studying both history and sociology, you'll develop an understanding of past societies and patterns of social change. A social sciences degree helps to frame and understand contemporary issues-debates such as race, gender and social divisions. This is compounded by combining the history element of the degree. This allows for a much deeper analysis to examine issues from an historical and sociological standpoint.

During the first year in History, you will develop an overview of the formation of the United Kingdom, alongside a study of local history and an introduction to historical studies. In the second and third year, you will progress to more focused studies on Britain, United States and Russia in the twentieth century. Subjects include the sociological imagination, body politics, sexuality and social control, gender studies, deviant and criminal behaviour and social research methods.

Study skills classes and tutorials will help you meet the academic challenges of the course and you will learn through a combination of lectures, seminars, group work, field work and in-house conferences. And a module on employability will support your graduate ambitions.

By the time you graduate You'll learn to exercise independent judgment, to be critical of accepted opinion and to present your arguments effectively. You will also learn research and information retrieval techniques.

ASSESSMENT DETAILS

Assessment will vary from module to module and is designed to help students develop and demonstrate a range of skills. The most common forms of assessments are essays, workbooks, portfolios, blogs and presentations or live briefs (individual and in groups) as well as formal exams and exam-style timed in-class writing assessments.

You will encounter a method called 'formative assessment' in some modules. This is carried out during the module and is a way of building your skills for the main assessments.



ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- 72 UCAS points from a minimum of two A-Levels or equivalent level 3 qualification eg. Extended diploma (MMP) or Access course (30 Level 3 credits at merit grade are required)
- GCSE English and Math at grade 4/C or above, or a willingness to obtain during your studies.

Course delivery

Our courses are delivered through teaching and learning methods which provide students with the widest possible exposure to a modern and innovative higher education experience. These methods vary and include attendance at lectures and seminars, practical work such as creative writing exercises, staging and participating in conferences, performances, presentations, producing work to be shared on social media, field trips, other relevant visits and e-learning through LEARN, the College's virtual learning environment, and CANVAS, ARU's learning management system.

COURSE FEES

Tuition fees:

Full-time: £9,000 (2022-2023)

We set our course fees annually. As students pay a fee for each year of their course, the fees set for future academic years may be higher than those set in the 2022/2023 academic year.

For each future academic year of your course of study, your fees may be subject to review and increase on a basis in line with the Retail Prices Index (RPI) plus 3%. RPI is a measure of inflation published monthly by the Office for National Statistics which measures the changes from month to month in the cost of a representative sample of retail goods and services bought by consumers within the UK. This means that your course fees will not be increased each year by more than RPI + 3% from the previous year's fees and will not ever exceed the maximum amount that the government allows higher education institutions to charge students in the related academic year.
